alcoholic, and frequently alternated between bouts of excessive drinking and hospitalization to receive treatment for the illnesses and complications it caused. The hospital had two functions: treating immigrants who were ill upon arrival, and treating immigrants with conditions that were prohibited by immigration laws. These latter patients were stabilized and often sent back to their home countries. Ellis covered a broad range of railway subjects in his books, the best-known of which is *The Trains we Loved* (Allen & Unwin, 1947).
