All modern computers store information in the form of bits (binary digits), using binary code. For this reason, all data stored on a computer is, in some sense, "binary". However, one particularly useful and ubiquitous type of data stored on a computer is one in which the bits represent text, by way of a character encoding. Those files are called "text files" and files which are not like that are referred to as "binary files", as a sort of retronym or hypernym.

An etymology from PIE *welo-* is offered by Matasović. The term *fili* likely derives from primitive Irish [VELITAS]; from Proto-Celtic **weleti* ("to see"); and Proto-Indo-European **wel-* ("to see, perceive"). He notes: "The semantic development of *Old Irish fil* was from 'Lo, behold' (lmpv. *Filé* powder is used in Louisiana Creole cuisine in the making of some types of gumbo, a thick Creole soup or stew often served over rice. Several different varieties exist. In New Orleans, what is known as Creole gumbo generally varies from house to house though still retaining its Native American origins. A portion of the computer main memory can be set up as a RAM disk that serves as a storage device for a file system. File systems such as *tmpfs* can store files in virtual memory.

There are many file system designs and implementations – with various structures and features and various resulting characteristics such as speed, flexibility, security, size, and more.

Some operating systems, such as *Multics*, *Unix-like* systems, *CP/M*, *DOS*, the classic *Mac OS*, and *Windows*, store text files as a sequence of bytes, with an end-of-line delimiter at the end of each line. Other operating systems, such as *OpenVMS* and *OS/360* and its successors, have record-oriented filesystems, in which text files are stored as a sequence either of fixed-length records or of variable-length records with a record-length value in the record header.

Mechanical tools and processes

In operating systems such as *CP/M*, where the operating system does not keep track of the file size in bytes, the end of a text file is denoted by placing one or more special characters, known as an end-of-file (EOF) marker, as padding after the last line in a text file. In modern operating systems such as *DOS*, *Microsoft Windows* and *Unix-like* systems, text files do not contain any special EOF character, because file systems on those operating systems keep track of the file size in bytes.

A file system provides a data storage service that allows applications to share mass storage. Without a file system, applications could access the storage in incompatible ways that lead to resource contention, data corruption, and data loss. A shared-disk file system uses a storage area network (SAN) to allow multiple computers to gain direct disk access at the block level. Access control and translation from file-level operations that applications use to block-level operations used by the SAN must take place on the client node. The most common type of clustered file system, the shared-disk file system – by adding mechanisms for concurrency control – provides a consistent and serializable view of the file system, avoiding corruption and unintended data loss even when multiple clients try to access the same files... Files can be shared with and transferred between computers and mobile devices via removable media, networks, or the Internet.
