Diffraction Diffraction is the same physical effect as interference, but interference is typically applied to superposition of a few waves and the term diffraction is used when many waves are superposed. these obstacles, and the resulting diffraction pattern is going to be the intensity profile based on the collective interference of all these light sources Diffraction is the deviation of waves from straight-line propagation without any change in their energy due to an obstacle or through an aperture. The diffracting object or aperture effectively becomes a secondary source of the propagating wave

Fabry-Pérot interferometer e. It is named after Charles Fabry and Alfred Perot, who developed the instrument in 1899. The measurable case of the intensity resulting from the interference of both backward-propagating electric fields results in the Airy distribution A In optics, a Fabry-Pérot interferometer (FPI) or etalon is an optical cavity made from two parallel reflecting surfaces (i. : thin mirrors). Optical waves can pass through the optical cavity only when they are in resonance with it. Etalon is from the French *étalon*, meaning "measuring gauge" or "standard"

The TIE was first proposed in 1983 by Michael Reed Teague. Teague suggested to use the law of conservation of energy to write a differential equation for the transport of energy by an optical field.

This equation, he stated, could be used as an approach to phase recovery. eedd4ee3d1

Double-slit experiment A low-intensity double-slit experiment was first performed by G. interference in the context of quantum mechanics. This type of experiment was first performed by Thomas Young in 1801 as a demonstration of the wave behavior of visible light. I. Thomas Young's experiment with light was part of classical physics long before the development of quantum mechanics and the concept of wave-particle duality. Taylor in 1909, by reducing the In modern physics, the double-slit experiment demonstrates that light and matter can exhibit behavior of both classical particles and classical waves. In 1927, Davisson and Germer and, independently, George Paget Thomson and his research student Alexander Reid demonstrated that electrons show the same behavior, which was later extended to atoms and molecules. He believed it demonstrated that Christiaan Huygens' wave theory of light was correct, and his experiment is sometimes referred to as Young's experiment or eedd4ee3d1

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Phase-contrast X-ray imaging Standard X-ray imaging techniques like radiography or computed tomography (CT) rely on a decrease of the X-ray beam's intensity (attenuation) when traversing the sample, which can be measured directly with the assistance of an X-ray detector. improve phase sensitivity in table-top PFI imagers. However, in phase contrast X-ray imaging, the beam's phase shift caused by the sample is not measured directly, but is transformed into variations in intensity, which then can be recorded by the detector. In PFI a phase grating is used to convert the fine interference fringes into a broad intensity pattern Phase-contrast X-ray imaging or phase-sensitive X-ray imaging is a general term for different technical methods that use information concerning changes in the phase of an X-ray beam that passes through an object in order to create its images eedd4ee3d1

Wave interference In physics, interference is a phenomenon in which two coherent waves are combined by adding their intensities or displacements with due consideration In physics, interference is a phenomenon in which two coherent waves are combined by adding their intensities or displacements with due consideration for their phase difference. The resultant wave may have greater amplitude (constructive interference) or lower amplitude (destructive interference) if the two waves are in phase or out of phase, respectively eedd4ee3d1

FLIC occurs whenever fluorescent objects are in the vicinity of a reflecting surface (e.g. Si wafer). The resulting interference between the direct and the reflected light leads to a double $\sin^2$ modulation of the intensity, I , of a fluorescent object as a function of distance, h , above the reflecting surface.
