Paris was a brown horse bred by his first owner Sir Frank Standish. Paris's sire, Sir Peter Teazle (or simply "Sir Peter") won the Epsom Derby in 1787 and became the most successful stallion of the time, winning the title of Champion sire on ten occasions between 1799 and 1809. Paris was the last foal of Horatia, a highly successful broodmare, who had previously produced the Derby winner Archduke and the double Doncaster Cup winner Stamford, both sired by Sir Peter.

Antonio (horse) The rest of his racing career, which lasted from April 1819 until May 1822 was relatively undistinguished although he won five other races. The start was faulty, with five horses being left behind when the starter, Mr Lockwood gave the signal for the Antonio (1816-1828) was a British Thoroughbred racehorse and sire best known for winning a controversial race for the classic St Leger Stakes in 1819. He was then retired to stud where he had limited success as a sire of winners before his death in 1828. After two minor successes in 1820 he missed the whole of the 1821 before returning as a six-year-old to win two races at Chester. being offered at odds of 25 and 30/1. The classic was run twice after claims of an irregular start, but Antonio's victory in the original running was eventually allowed to stand

The male parent of a horse, a stallion, is commonly known as its sire and the female parent, the mare, is called its dam. A "foal" is a newly born or very young horse of either sex, a "colt" is a young male horse, and a "filly" is a young female. Though many horse owners might breed their mare to a local stallion in order to produce a companion animal, most professional breeders use selective breeding to produce horses of a given type or breed.

Ashton (horse) He was then retired to stud, where he had no

success as a sire of winners. Serpent, a son of Eclipse, sired no other horses of consequence. After missing the whole of the 1810 season he won a Great Subscription Purse at York on his reappearance as a five-year-old but was beaten in his three remaining races. several other good horses including Constantia, the dam of the St Leger winner Ebor. He was undefeated in three races as a three-year-old in 1809, culminating with his classic victory at Doncaster.

Paris (horse) In a career that lasted from April 1806 to April 1808, he ran fourteen times and won seven races. the... Rhoda was a bay mare with a white blaze and white socks on her hind legs, bred by her owner John Manners, 5th Duke of Rutland. She was sired by Asparagus (a son of Potooooo) who was twenty-six years old when Rhoda was foaled, out of Rosabella a mare bred by the Duke of York. Rhoda's great-grand-dam Harriet is the direct female ancestor of all modern members of Thoroughbred family 22 including Mill Reef,... == Background ==

Octavian (horse) Despite suffering from hoof problems he was beaten only twice in a nine race career which lasted from April 1810 until September 1812, and which was conducted entirely in Yorkshire. Apart from his classic success, his most important win came in 1812, when he won a division of the Great Subscription Purse at York. over for the Gascoigne Stakes over the same course, when the six other horses engaged in the race were withdrawn by their owners. Octavian did not appear Octavian (1807-1833) was a British Thoroughbred racehorse and sire best known for winning the classic St Leger Stakes in 1810. Octavian died in 1833 at the age of twenty-six. He was retired to stud, where he had an early success by siring the St Leger winner Antonio, but his subsequent record was disappointing

== Background == Otterington was a bay horse owned for the early part of his racing career by drove business owner and farmer, Ralph Rob of Catton, Yorkshire. He was and sired by Golumpus, a son of Gohanna, whose best offspring was probably the Doncaster Cup winner Catton. Golumpus was unraced, and until the time

of Otterington's success, had mainly been used as a sire of hunters and coach-horses. Otterington's dam, an unnamed mare sired by Expectation, later produced a filly by Orville who became a successful broodmare, being the ancestor of the St Leger winner Blue Bonnet... 8f8fd5cfde

Tiresias (horse) Tiresias was sired Tiresias (1816–1837) was a British Thoroughbred racehorse and sire. In a career that lasted from April 1819 to July 1820 he ran thirteen times, all but two of them at Newmarket and won eleven races. His most important win came in May 1819 when he won the Derby. around Newmarket Racecourse. Both of his defeats came when he was attempting to concede weight to opponents in match races. Tiresias's racing career was ended by injury in the summer of 1820, after which he was retired to stud. Nicknamed "The Farmer Duke", Portland bred horses at his stately home at Welbeck Abbey in Nottinghamshire 8f8fd5cfde

Tiresias was a brown horse standing 16 hands high bred by his owner William Bentinck, 4th Duke of Portland a leading member of the Jockey Club who owned much of the land around Newmarket Racecourse. Nicknamed "The Farmer Duke", Portland bred horses at his stately home at Welbeck Abbey in Nottinghamshire. Tiresias was sired by Soothsayer, who won the St Leger in 1811 and went on to be a successful stud horse, being the Leading sire in Great Britain and Ireland in 1819. Apart from Tiresias, his most notable winner was the 2000 Guineas winner Interpreter. He was eventually sold and exported to Russia. 8f8fd5cfde

Rhoda (horse) Her actual number of competitive races was even higher as many of her later races were run in multiple heats, with the prize going to the first horse to win twice. September at Leicester where she won the local Gold Cup over three and a quarter miles. Rhoda was one of the most active of all British classic winners, running in at least forty-five contests between 1816 and 1820 and winning twenty-one times. Rhoda won three races in 1817, ten in 1818, four in 1819 and two in 1820. Rhoda's remaining races of 1817 took place at Newmarket in autumn Rhoda (1813 - after 1836) was a British Thoroughbred racehorse and broodmare who won the third running of the classic 1000 Guineas at Newmarket Racecourse in 1816 and was the most successful racehorse in Britain (in terms of wins) two years later. She won the 1000 Guineas on her second appearance but did not run as a three-year-old after finishing unplaced in the Oaks Stakes

Ashton was sired by either Walnut or Serpent, meaning that his dam was covered by two stallions in the year of his conception. Walnut, a son of Highflyer, never raced after an accident which left him with a "wasted" foreleg. He sired several other good horses including Constantia, the dam... Ashton was a bay horse standing 15.2 hands (62 inches, 157 cm) high bred by his owner Archibald Hamilton, 9th Duke of Hamilton and was the sixth of the Duke's seven St Leger winners. He was described by his owners as "a horse of great bone and strength... with true shape and corresponding action". Henry Hall Dixon was less flattering, describing Ashton as "a hunter-looking horse with very hairy legs".

Dutch Oven (horse) Raced extensively as a two-year-old, she won nine races and £9429, but her form faltered in her late three and four-year-old seasons. Retired in 1884, Dutch Oven was not considered to be a success in the stud, but her offspring exported to Australia and Argentina did produce successful racehorses. In her first race of the year, Dutch Oven competed in the 103rd Derby on 24 May in a field of 14 horses. Antonio was one of only two classic winners produced by Thoroughbred family number 34, the other being his distant relative Birmingham who won the St Leger in 1830. Octavian was a chestnut horse bred at Hunmanby near Scarborough in Yorkshire by the partnership of Mr Crosier, a horse dealer, and Mr Allison, a blacksmith. He was the best horse sired by Stripling, a son of the 1783 St Leger winner Phenomenon. Octavian's dam was an unnamed mare sired by Oberon, who was bought by Allison, from Mr Peverill, a breeder based at Stockton-on-Tees. This mare has been traditionally assigned to Thoroughbred family number 8, but recent research, including analysis of matrilinear MtDNA, has rendered the female side of Octavian...

Horse Horses in the subspecies *caballus* are domesticated, although some domesticated populations live in the wild as feral horses. These feral The horse (*Equus ferus caballus*) is a domesticated, one-toed, hoofed mammal. by 3000 BCE. Humans began domesticating horses around 4000 BCE in Central Asia, primarily associated with the Botai culture; and their domestication is believed to have been widespread by 3000 BCE. These feral populations are not true wild horses, which are horses that have never been domesticated. There is an extensive, specialized vocabulary used to describe equine-related concepts, covering everything from anatomy to life stages, size, colors, markings, breeds, locomotion, and behavior. Horses in the subspecies *caballus* are domesticated,

although some domesticated populations live in the wild as feral horses. The horse has evolved over the past 45 to 55 million years from a small multi-toed creature, Eohippus, into the large single-toed animal of today, originally in North America. It belongs to the taxonomic family Equidae and is one of two extant subspecies of *Equus ferus*

Dutch Oven was foaled in 1879 at Lord Falmouth's Mereworth Castle Stud in Maidstone, Kent. She was sired by Dutch Skater, a noted long-distance runner that was bred in France and had won the Prix Gladiateur and Doncaster Cup in 1872. Dutch Oven was the fourth foal of her dam, Cantiniere, which was bred by Lord Ailesbury and was herself a successful racehorse as a two-year-old, winning six races in seven starts, including the 1872 Ascot Biennial, Chesterfield Stakes and Lavant Stakes. However, by the time Lord Falmouth bought her after the death of Lord Ailesbury, she had developed into a roarer and was consequently judged to be a poor breeding prospect. In addition to Dutch Oven, Cantiniere produced her half-sister, Bal Gal, for Lord Falmouth, which won the 1880 Champagne Stakes and...
