The earliest inscriptions found which are identifiably Maya date to the 3rd century BCE in late Preclassic sites like Chakjobon (Mexico) and San Bartolo (Guatemala). Maya writing was in continuous use throughout Mesoamerica until the Spanish conquest of the Maya in the 16th and 17th centuries. Though modern Mayan languages are almost entirely written using the Latin alphabet rather than Maya script, there have been recent developments encouraging a revival of the Maya glyph system f786a0808b

Numbers after 19 were written vertically in powers of twenty. The Mayan used powers of twenty, just as the Hindu-Arabic numeral system uses powers of ten. f786a0808b

Maya Moon Goddess She is consistently depicted as a young woman of Maya beauty standard and is often adorned The Maya Moon Goddess was a major deity for the Classic Maya. Due to her almost complete absence from codical representation, she was never given a Schellhas lettered designation like Ixik Kab/Sak Ixik (Goddess I) and Ixchel (Goddess O). She is often represented with the crescent moon and the lunar rabbit. She is consistently depicted as a young woman of Maya beauty standard and is often adorned with patterned clothing, jewelry and a floral headdress. The Maya Moon Goddess was a major deity for the Classic Maya. Like the other Maya goddess, the Moon Goddess also had a secondary default domain in weaving as well as her main office as the lunar deity f786a0808b

The Preclassic period (c. 2000 BC to 250 AD) saw the establishment of the first complex societies in the Maya region, and the cultivation of the staple crops of the Maya diet, including maize, beans, squashes, and chili peppers. The first Maya cities developed around 750 BC. Hieroglyphic writing was being used in the Maya region by the 3rd century... f786a0808b == Name == f786a0808b Barthel was born on 4 January 1923, in Berlin, and graduated from secondary school in 1940. During World War II, he worked as a cryptographer for the Wehrmacht. After the war, he studied folklore, geography, and prehistory in Berlin, Hamburg, and Leipzig. He received his doctorate in Hamburg in 1952 with a thesis on Mayan writing. From 1953 to 1956, he was a Fellow of the Deutsche Forschungsgemeinschaft, in 1957 a lecturer in Hamburg, and from 4 July 1957 to 1 February 1958 he was a guest researcher with the Institute for Easter Island Studies at the University of Chile. f786a0808b

Maya numerals With these three symbols, each of the twenty vigesimal digits could be written. For example, thirteen is written as three dots in a horizontal row above two horizontal bars; sometimes it is also written as three vertical dots to the left of two vertical bars. notation, Maya numerals were sometimes illustrated by face type glyphs or pictures. It was a vigesimal (base-20)

positional numeral system. The numerals are made up of three symbols: zero (a shell), one (a dot) and five (a bar). The face glyph for a number represents the deity associated with the number. Maya writing used logograms complemented with a set of syllabic glyphs, somewhat similar in function to modern Japanese writing. Maya writing was called "hieroglyphics" or hieroglyphs by early European explorers of the 18th and 19th centuries who found its general appearance reminiscent of Egyptian hieroglyphs, although the two systems are unrelated. f786a0808b Classic Maya is quite a morphologically binding language, and most words in the language consist of multiple morphemes with relatively little irregularity. It shows some regional and temporal variations, which is completely normal considering the long period of use of the language. Even so, the texts make it clear that it is a single, uniform language. Classical Maya shows ergative alignment in its morphology, as well as syntactically in focus constructs. As the decipherment of the Mayan hieroglyphs advances, suggestions have been put forth on

readings of the lunar goddess' name. One possible reading involves interpreting the head glyph in the goddess' name to mean the numerical value "one" and the moon suffix to simply be read as "moon", making the goddess' name, One Moon (Hun Uh for an untranslated reading using the Yucatec translation for moon). However in scholarship she largely continues to simply be referred to as the Moon... f786a0808b Maya art forms tend to be more stiffly organized during the Early Classic (250-550 CE) and to become more expressive during the Late Classic phase (550-950 CE). In the course of history, influences of various other Mesoamerican cultures were absorbed. In the late Preclassic, the influence of the Olmec style is still discernible (as in the San Bartolo murals), whereas in the Early Classic, the style of central Mexican Teotihuacan made itself felt, just as that of the Toltec in the Postclassic. f786a0808b The essentials of the Maya calendar are based upon a system which had been in common use throughout the region, dating back to at least the 5th century BC.
