Black dot (disease) *Coccodes*). It affects all underground parts of the potato, including the roots, tuber, and stolon. It can be introduced into an area by planting an infected tuber, and then spreading to other plants. *C. coccodes* is also able to infect the stem and foliage of the potato plant. This can be used to diagnose black dot. A sign of black dot disease is black microsclerotia that are produced by the pathogen, and can be found on the roots, the tuber, the stems, and the leaves. During the 1950s, an outbreak of Panama disease almost wiped out commercial Gros Michel banana production. Dutch elm disease (DED) is caused by a member of the sac fungi (Ascomycota) affecting elm trees, and is spread by elm bark beetles.
