Higher-order thinking, also known as higher order thinking skills (HOTS), is a concept applied in relation to education reform and based on learning taxonomies Higher-order thinking, also known as higher order thinking skills (HOTS), is a concept applied in relation to education reform and based on learning taxonomies (such as American psychologist Benjamin Bloom's taxonomy). Higher-order thinking involves the learning of complex judgmental skills such as critical thinking and problem solving. In Bloom's taxonomy, for example, skills involving analysis, evaluation and synthesis (creation of new knowledge) are thought to be of a higher order than the learning of facts and concepts using lower-order thinking skills, which require different learning and teaching methods

The failure of such attempts, often in the form of being unable to account for various counter examples, has led many theorists to adopt less precise conceptions. There is wide agreement that education involves, among other things, the transmission of knowledge. Others understand it not as a process but as the product of such processes, i. Some definitions see education as a process exemplified in events like schooling, teaching, and learning. understanding, skills, like rationality and critical thinking, and character traits, like kindness and honesty. e. as what characterizes educated persons. Various attempts have been made to give precise definitions listing its necessary and sufficient conditions. But there are deep disagreements about its exact nature and characteristics aedf2f7449

This concept is also termed as psychosocial competency. The subject varies greatly depending on social norms and community expectations but skills that function for well-being and aid individuals to develop into active and productive members of their communities are considered as life skills aedf2f7449
