Among his numerous publications were a four-volume Dictionary of Birds (1893–6), entries on ornithology in the Encyclopædia Britannica (9th edition) while also an editor of the journal Ibis from 1865 to 1870. Newton was Professor of Comparative Anatomy at Cambridge University from 1866 to 1907. He founded the British Ornithologists Union. Neural plate Cranial to the primitive node of the embryonic primitive streak, ectodermal tissue thickens and flattens to become the neural plate.
