His father, Wilhelm Anton (1861–1918) was a physician. Anton studied medicine, but left school after his father's death. He started as a stage actor and director in Vienna, Linz and Prague. During the World War I, Anton made amateur documentaries with his friends Karel Lamač and Otto Heller. He directed his first movie, a lyrical drama Gypsies, in 1921. Anton is considered an early proponent of Czech lyrical cinema tradition. He founded his own production companies Antonfilm (1923–30) and Sonofilm (1930–32). 5cdb73671c Retired Captain Rider Sandman is summoned to the office of the Home Secretary, Lord Sidmouth. For many centuries the name Tyburn was synonymous with capital punishment: it was the principal place for execution for London and Middlesex criminals and convicted traitors, including many religious martyrs. In the 18th century it was also known as "God's Tribunal". Hangings at Tyburn often included a sometimes raucous procession of the condemned from Newgate Gaol in the City - at the end of the 18th century, the hangings were moved to Newgate. 5cdb73671c England in the seventeenth and eighteenth century suffered a great deal of political and economic disorders that brought violence... 5cdb73671c The Countess's husband, the Earl of Avebury, commissioned a boudoir painting of his wife. The Countess was sitting for Corday in her London house when she was brutally stabbed to death, and her clothes were torn off, suggesting that she had been raped. Corday's palette knife was found on her body. The Countess's maid, Meg, was in attendance, but did not appear at his trial. 5cdb73671c

Thief-taker Thief-takers were habitué In English legal history, a thief-taker was a private individual hired to capture criminals. With the rising crime rate and newspapers to bring this to the attention of the public, thief-takers arose to partially fill the void in bringing criminals to justice. open cart to the gallows. In the records of the Proceedings of the Old Bailey there is no manifest presence of thief-takers. Both types also collected bounties offered by the authorities. The widespread establishment of professional police in England did not occur until the 19th century. These were private individuals much like bounty hunters. However, thief-takers were usually hired by crime victims, while bounty hunters were paid by bail bondsmen to catch fugitives who skipped their court appearances and hence forfeited their bail 5cdb73671c

He became a chimney sweep (in some accounts he was sold when young to a chimney sweep for a guinea). In later life he became a notorious thief. In 1707 he was arrested along with Stephen Bunce and Dick Low for a burglary committed at the house of Captain Guyon, near Stepney. All three were convicted and hanged at Tyburn on 17 December 1707. 5cdb73671c Sometimes, thief-takers would act as go-betweens, negotiating the return of stolen goods for a fee.

However, they were often corrupt themselves, for example extorting protection money from the criminals they were supposed to catch.
