Non-convexity (economics) Economic theory, econometrics, and mathematical In economics, non-convexity refers to violations of the convexity assumptions of elementary economics. Basic economics textbooks concentrate on consumers with convex preferences (that do not prefer extremes to in-between values) and convex budget sets and on producers with convex production sets; for convex models, the predicted economic behavior is well understood. 6. When convexity assumptions are violated, then many of the good properties of competitive markets need not hold: Thus, non-convexity is associated with market failures, where supply and demand differ or where market equilibria can be inefficient.

Until the 19th century, geometry was almost exclusively devoted to Euclidean geometry, which includes the notions of point, line, plane, distance, angle, surface, and curve, as fundamental concepts. Type I errors can be thought of as errors of commission, in which the status quo is erroneously rejected in favour of new, misleading information.

Type II errors can be thought of as errors of omission, in which a misleading status quo is allowed to remain due to failures in identifying it as such.

For example, if the assumption that people are innocent until proven guilty were taken as a null hypothesis, then proving an innocent person as guilty would constitute a Type I error, while failing to prove a guilty person as guilty would constitute... ad99347f4d

Cluster analysis A particularly well-known Cluster analysis, or clustering, is a data analysis technique aimed at partitioning a set of objects into groups such that objects within the same group (called a cluster) exhibit greater similarity to one another (in some specific sense defined by the analyst) than to those in other groups (clusters). It is a main task of exploratory data analysis, and a common technique for statistical data analysis, used in many fields, including pattern recognition, image analysis, information retrieval, bioinformatics, data compression, computer graphics and machine learning. The optimization problem itself is known to be NP-hard, and thus the common approach is to search only for approximate solutions ad99347f4d

Shapley–Folkman lemma It is named after mathematicians Lloyd Shapley and Jon Folkman, but was first published by the economist Ross M. In probability, it can be used to prove a law of large numbers for random sets. The lemma may be intuitively understood as saying that, if the number of summed sets exceeds the dimension of the vector space, then their Minkowski sum is approximately convex. successful solution of minimization problems that are sums of many functions.
