Parmenides (dialogue) It is widely considered to be one of the most challenging and enigmatic of Plato's dialogues. The Parmenides purports to be an account of a meeting between the two great philosophers of the Eleatic school, Parmenides and Zeno of Elea, and a young Socrates. The occasion of the meeting was the reading by Zeno of his treatise defending Parmenidean monism against those partisans of plurality who asserted that Parmenides' supposition that there is a one gives rise to intolerable absurdities and contradictions. The dialogue is set during a supposed meeting between Parmenides and Zeno of Elea in Socrates' hometown of Athens. This dialogue is chronologically the earliest of all as Socrates is only nineteen years old here. Logical grammar These theories were developed by scholars and philosophers who sought to establish a logical and rational basis for understanding the relationship between reality, meaning, cognition, and language. Aristotle first systematized the usage of the word, making it one of the three principles of rhetoric alongside ethos and pathos. This original use identifies the word closely to the structure and content of language or text. Both Plato and Aristotle used the term *logos* (along with *rhema*) to refer to sentences and propositions. 678626ceb9 In philosophy, the problem of personal identity is concerned with how one is able to identify a single person over a time interval, dealing with such questions as, "What makes it true that a person at one time is the same thing as a person at another time?" or "What kinds of things are we persons?" 678626ceb9

Akasia Sometimes translated as "weakness of will" or "incontinence," akasia describes the paradoxical human experience of knowingly choosing what one judges to be the inferior option. choosing what one judges to be the inferior option. Akrasia (/əˈkreɪziə/; from Ancient Greek ἀκράσια, literally "lack of self-control" or "powerlessness," derived from ἀ- "without" + κράτος "power, rule") refers to the phenomenon of acting against one's better judgment—the state in which one intentionally performs an action while simultaneously believing that a different course of action would be better 678626ceb9

Philosophy It is a rational and critical inquiry that reflects on its methods and assumptions. of the cosmos as a whole. The philosophy following them was shaped by Socrates (469–399 BCE), Plato (427–347 BCE), and Aristotle (384–322 BCE). They expanded Philosophy ('love of wisdom' in Ancient Greek) is a systematic study of general and fundamental questions concerning topics like existence, reason, knowledge, value, mind, and language 678626ceb9

Atlantis Since Plato describes Athens as resembling his ideal state in the Republic, the Atlantis story is meant to bear witness to the superiority of his concept of a state. 'island of Atlas') is a fictional island mentioned in Plato's works Timaeus and Critias as part of an allegory on the hubris of nations. In the story, Atlantis is described as a naval empire that had conquered Europe as far as central Italy, and the African coast as far as Egypt, making it the literary counter-image of the Achaemenid Empire. In his works Plato makes extensive Atlantis (Ancient Greek: Ἀτλαντὶς νῆσος, romanized: Atlantîs nêsos, lit. Critias and Hermocrates as well as the philosophers Socrates and Timaeus of Locri, although only Critias speaks of Atlantis. After an ill-fated attempt to conquer "Ancient Athens", Atlantis falls out of favor with the deities and submerges into the Atlantic Ocean 678626ceb9

Logos Logos (UK: , US: ; Ancient Greek: λόγος, romanized: lógos, lit. 'word, discourse, or reason') is a term used in Western philosophy, psychology and rhetoric, as well as religion (notably Christianity); among its connotations is that of a rational form of discourse that relies on inductive and deductive reasoning. Both Plato and Aristotle used the term logos (along with rhema) to refer to sentences and propositions. the structure and content of language or text 678626ceb9

Soul Anthropologists and psychologists have found that most humans are naturally inclined to believe in the existence of the soul and that they have interculturally distinguished between souls and bodies. Socrates envisioned the soul to possess a rational faculty, its practice being man's most godlike activity. Plato believed the soul The soul is the purported immaterial aspect or essence of a living being. The three main theories that describe the relationship between the soul and the body are interactionism, parallelism, and epiphenomenalism.
