Normality (behavior) Similarly, a behavioral pattern may not conform to social Normality is a behavior that can be normal for an individual (intrapersonal normality) when it is

consistent with the most common behavior for that person. Someone being seen as normal or not normal can have social ramifications, such as being included, excluded or stigmatized by wider society. There can be a difference between the normality of a body part's structure and its function. In many cases normality is used to make moral judgements, such that normality is seen as good while abnormality is seen as bad, or conversely normality can be seen as boring and uninteresting. Normal is also used to describe individual behavior that conforms to the most common behavior in society (known as conformity). However, normal behavior is often only recognized in contrast to abnormality 1684c4d6e1
