Under normal conditions, the heart's sinoatrial node (SA node) determines the rate by which the organ beats - in other words, it is the heart's "pacemaker". The electrical

activity of sinus rhythm originates in the sinoatrial node and depolarizes the atria. Current then passes from the atria through the atrioventricular node and into the bundle of His, from which it travels along Purkinje fibers to reach and depolarize the ventricles. This sinus rhythm is important because it ensures that the heart's atria reliably contract before the ventricles, ensuring as optimal... e1d2809052

Portal hypertension The portal vein and its branches supply most of the blood and nutrients from the intestine to the liver. Normal portal pressure is 1–4 mmHg; clinically insignificant portal hypertension is present at portal pressures 5–9 mmHg; clinically significant portal hypertension is present at portal pressures greater than 10 mmHg. The pathophysiology of non-cirrhotic portal hypertension is most commonly disrupted blood flow to or from the liver. This results in a backing up of blood Portal hypertension is defined as increased portal venous pressure, with a hepatic venous pressure gradient greater than 5 mmHg e1d2809052

Chronic pulmonary heart disease usually results in right ventricular hypertrophy

(RVH), whereas acute pulmonary heart disease usually results in dilatation. Hypertrophy is an adaptive response to a long-term increase in pressure. Individual muscle cells grow larger (in thickness) and change to drive the increased contractile force required to move the blood against greater resistance. Dilatation is a stretching (in length) of the ventricle in response to acute increased pressure. e1d2809052

Essential tremor It is typically symmetrical, and affects the arms, hands, or fingers; but sometimes involves the head, vocal cords, or other body parts. This means that it is distinct from a resting tremor, such as that caused by Parkinson's disease, which is not correlated. Essential tremor is either an action (intention) tremor—it intensifies when one tries to use the affected muscles during
