Dunning–Kruger effect literacy. There is disagreement about the causes of the Dunning–Kruger effect. It was first described by the psychologists David Dunning and Justin Kruger in 1999. In popular culture, the Dunning–Kruger effect is often misunderstood as a claim about general overconfidence of people with low intelligence instead of specific overconfidence of people unskilled at a particular task. Some researchers also include the opposite effect for high performers' tendency to underestimate their skills. According to the metacognitive explanation, poor performers misjudge their abilities The Dunning–Kruger effect is a cognitive bias in which people with limited competence in a particular domain overestimate their abilities ab27c3cebc

Constructivist approaches to human learning have led to the development of the theory of cognitive apprenticeship. This theory accounts for the problem that masters of a skill often fail to take into account the implicit processes involved in carrying out complex skills when they are teaching novices. To combat these tendencies, cognitive apprenticeships "...are designed, among other things, to bring these tacit processes into the open, where students can observe, enact, and practice them with help from the teacher...". Metacognition There are generally two components of metacognition: (1) cognitive conceptions and (2) a cognitive regulation system. Language Awareness, WWW, 11 (4) Metacognition is an awareness of one's thought processes and an understanding of the patterns behind them. Research has shown that both components of metacognition play key roles in metaconceptual knowledge and learning. (2001). The term comes from the root word meta, meaning "beyond", or "on top of". Metamemory, defined as knowing about memory and mnemonic strategies, is an important aspect of metacognition.
