Word order is normally subject-object-verb with particles marking the grammatical function of words, and sentence structure is topic-comment. Nouns have no grammatical number or gender, and there are no articles. characteristic of adverbs is that they cannot occur in a predicate position, just as it is in English. Sentence-final particles are used to add emotional or emphatic impact, or make questions. Its phrases are exclusively head-final and compound sentences are exclusively left-branching. Kana itself consists of a pair of syllabaries: hiragana, used primarily for native or naturalized Japanese words and grammatical elements; and katakana, used primarily for foreign words and names, loanwords, onomatopoeia, scientific names, and sometimes for emphasis.
