The word ship has meant, depending on era and context, either simply a large vessel or specifically a full-rigged ship with three or more masts, each of which is square rigged.

Squat effect Squat effect from a combination of vertical sinkage and a change of trim may cause the vessel to dip towards the stern or towards the bow. This is understood to be a function of the Block coefficient of the vessel concerned, finer lined vessels $C_b < 0$. Ship Ship transport is responsible for the largest portion of world commerce. Ships are generally distinguished from boats, based on size, shape, load capacity and purpose. Ships have supported exploration, trade, warfare, migration, colonization, and science. Metacentric height A larger metacentric height implies greater initial stability against overturning. The centre of gravity of the ship is commonly denoted as point G or CG. The metacentric height also influences the natural period of rolling of a hull, with very large metacentric heights being associated with shorter periods of roll which are uncomfortable for passengers. in naval architecture. It is calculated as the distance between the centre of gravity of a ship and its metacentre. Hence, a sufficiently, but not excessively, high metacentric height is considered ideal for passenger ships. Ship resistance and propulsion (Main article: Wave-making resistance) A ship moving over the surface of undisturbed water sets up waves A ship must be designed to move efficiently through the water with a minimum of external force. For thousands of years ship designers and builders of sailing vessels used rules of thumb based on the midship-section area to size the sails for a given vessel. surface until it reaches the field flow of the water. It was not until the advent of steam power and the construction of large iron ships in the mid-19th century that it became clear to ship owners and builders that a more rigorous approach was needed. Naval architecture Ship design calculations are also required for ships being modified (by means of conversion, rebuilding, modernization, or repair). Naval architecture involves basic and applied research, design, development, design evaluation (classification) and calculations during all stages of the life of a marine vehicle. Preliminary design of the vessel, its detailed design, construction, trials, operation and maintenance, launching and dry-docking are the main activities involved. Catamaran The catamaran's wider stance on the water can reduce both heeling and wave-induced motion, as compared with a monohull, and can give reduced wakes. expansion to the islands of the Indian and Pacific Oceans. The two hulls combined also often have a smaller hydrodynamic resistance than comparable monohulls, requiring less propulsive power from either sails or motors. Catamarans range in size from small sailing or rowing vessels to large naval ships and roll-on/roll-off A catamaran () (informally, a "cat") is a watercraft with two parallel hulls of equal size. Catamarans typically have less hull volume, smaller displacement, and shallower draft (draught) than monohulls of comparable length. The wide distance between a catamaran's hulls imparts stability through resistance to rolling and overturning; no ballast is required 6a14d374bd
