Practical Kabbalah Its teachings include the use of divine and angelic names for amulets and incantations. It was considered permitted white magic by its practitioners, reserved for the elite, who could separate its spiritual source from qliploth realms of evil if performed under circumstances that were holy (Q-D-Š) and pure, tumah and taharah (טומאה וטהרה). The concern of overstepping Judaism's prohibitions against impure magic ensured it remained a minor tradition in Jewish history.
