

Review Guide Respiratory System Answer

Hypercapnia clear carbon dioxide, or inhalation of elevated levels of CO₂, leads to respiratory acidosis. Carbon dioxide is a gaseous product of the body's metabolism and is normally expelled through the lungs. Carbon dioxide may accumulate in any condition that causes hypoventilation, a reduction of alveolar ventilation (the clearance of air from the small sacs of the lung where gas exchange takes place) as well as resulting from inhalation of CO₂. Inability of the lungs to clear carbon dioxide, or inhalation of elevated levels of CO₂, leads to respiratory acidosis. Eventually the body compensates for the raised acidity by retaining alkali in the kidneys, a process known as "metabolic compensation. Oxygen therapy It can also be given through bypassing the airway, such as in ECMO therapy. Higher oxygen concentrations can also increase the risk of airway Oxygen therapy, also referred to as supplemental oxygen, is the use of oxygen as medical treatment. It may also be prophylactically given to maintain blood oxygen levels during the induction of anesthesia. Acute indications for therapy include hypoxemia (low blood oxygen levels), carbon monoxide toxicity and cluster headache. Oxygen therapy is often useful in chronic hypoxemia caused by conditions such as severe COPD or cystic fibrosis. Supplemental oxygen can also refer to the use of oxygen enriched air at altitude. Oxygen can be delivered via nasal cannula, face mask, or endotracheal intubation at normal atmospheric pressure, or in a hyperbaric chamber. concentrations can result in oxygen toxicity, leading to lung damage and respiratory failure

Shortness of breath Distinct sensations include effort/work to breathe, chest tightness or pain, and "air hunger" (the feeling of not enough oxygen). Health effects of electronic cigarettes A 2014 review concluded that metal nanoparticles can deposit Electronic cigarettes (ecigs) are much less harmful than cigarettes which burn, but worse than not smoking at all. Vaping is associated with heart failure. Ecigs increase the risk of asthma and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) compared to not using nicotine at all. Of those who develop symptoms noticeable enough to be classified as patients, most (81%) develop mild to moderate symptoms (up to mild pneumonia), while 14% develop severe symptoms (dyspnea, hypoxia, or more than 50% lung involvement on imaging), and 5% develop critical symptoms (respiratory failure, shock, or multiorgan dysfunction).
