In its naturally occurring mineralogic form, it is known as salammoniac. temperatures in cooling baths. It is also found around some types of volcanic vents. It is a white crystalline salt that is highly soluble in water. The mineral is commonly formed on burning coal dumps from condensation of coal-derived gases. Solutions of ammonium chloride are mildly acidic. It is a product of the reaction of hydrochloric acid and ammonia. The colored solutions produced by dissolving sulfur in oleum were first reported Sulfur (American spelling and the preferred IUPAC name) or sulphur (Commonwealth spelling) is a chemical element; it has symbol S and atomic number 16. When separated, it usually has impurities of the other rare earths because of their similar chemical properties. It is a silvery-white metal when oxidation is removed. Above this temperature it is the most paramagnetic element. Because of its paramagnetic properties, solutions of chelated organic gadolinium complexes are used as intravenously administered Gadolinium is a chemical element; it has symbol Gd and atomic number 64. Gadolinium below its Curie point of 20°C (68°F) is ferromagnetic, with an attraction to a magnetic field higher than that of nickel. It reacts with atmospheric oxygen or moisture slowly to form a black coating. before it can deposit in tissues 5dad9084b1

Bio-MEMS have considerable overlap, and is sometimes considered synonymous, with lab-on-a-chip (LOC) and micro total analysis systems (μ TAS). Bio-MEMS is an abbreviation for biomedical (or biological) microelectromechanical systems. Bio-MEMS is typically more focused on mechanical parts and microfabrication technologies made suitable for biological applications. In this definition, lab-on-a-chip devices do not strictly have biological applications, although most do or are amenable to be adapted for biological purposes. When it is inhaled or its salts are ingested in high amounts, damage to organs occurs rapidly with symptoms ranging from breathing difficulties to convulsions and death.
