== Name == 478583edc6 Sharp was born in Paisley and educated at Glasgow Academy and the University of Glasgow, which he attended 1871-1872 without completing a degree. In 1872 he contracted typhoid. During 1874-5 he worked in a Glasgow law office. His health broke down in 1876 and he was sent on a voyage to Australia. In 1878 he took a position in a bank in London. 478583edc6 It was one of the three great Western story cycles recalled repeatedly in medieval literature, together with the Matter of France, which concerned the legends of Charlemagne and his companions, as well as the Matter of Rome, which included material derived from or inspired by classical mythology and classical history. Its pseudo-chronicle and chivalric romance works, written both in prose and verse, flourished from the 12th to the 16th century. 478583edc6

Varying scholars reject the former notion, but note that there were certain traditions and practices present in both the Irish and British churches that were not seen in the wider Christian world. 478583edc6

== Celts, Celtae == 478583edc6 == Language == 478583edc6 The linguistic sense of Celts, a grouping of all speakers of Celtic languages, is modern. There is scant record of the term "Celt" being used prior to the 17th century in connection with the inhabitants of Ireland and Great Britain during the Iron Age. However, Parthenius writes that Celtus descended through Heracles from Bretannos, which may have been a partial (because the myth's roots are older) post-Gallic War epithet of Druids who traveled to the islands for formal study, and was the posited seat of the order's origins. 478583edc6 There is ongoing debate about the scale, timing and nature of the Anglo-Saxon settlements and also about what happened to the existing populations of the regions where the migrants settled. The available evidence includes a small number of medieval texts which emphasise Saxon settlement and violence in the 5th century but do not give many clear or reliable details. Linguistic, archaeological and genetic information have played an increasing role in attempts to better understand what happened. 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Classical authors placed the druids only in Gaul and Britain, never among the other Celtic-speaking peoples. The earliest notices, of the 4th and 3rd centuries BCE, treat them as 'barbarian' philosophers akin to the Persian magi and the Indian gymnosophists. Much of the surviving material descends from the lost ethnography of Posidonius, and the fullest account is that of Julius Caesar, whose reliability has long been debated. The druids were credited with teaching the immortality of the soul and with officiating at sacrifices. 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Anglo-Saxon settlement of Britain The British Celtic and Latin dialects spoken in Britain in imperial times had very little impact The settlement of Great Britain by Germanic peoples from continental Europe led to the development of an Anglo-Saxon cultural identity and a shared Germanic language, Old English, whose closest known relative was Old Frisian, spoken on the other side of the North Sea. In the early 5th century, during the end of Roman rule in Britain and the breakdown of the Roman economy, larger numbers arrived, and their influence upon local culture and politics increased. increasing role in attempts to better understand what happened. The first Germanic speakers to settle in Britain permanently are likely to have been soldiers recruited by the Roman administration in Britain in the 4th century or earlier 478583edc6

Traditionally, a powerful ruler was acknowledged as High King of Ireland. It comprised the whole island before Anglo-Normans conquered parts of Ireland in the 1170s.
