Struggle for existence It can refer to human society, or to organisms in nature. drew on Benjamin Franklin's Observations Concerning the Increase of Mankind, Peopling of Countries, etc. The concept is ancient, and the term struggle for existence was in use by the end of the 18th century. Charles Darwin His proposition that all species of life have descended from a common ancestor is now generally accepted and considered a fundamental scientific concept. Darwin has been described as one of the most influential figures in human history and was honoured by burial in Westminster Abbey. HMS Beagle from 1831 to 1836 that truly established Darwin as an eminent geologist. In a joint presentation with Alfred Russel Wallace, he introduced his scientific theory that this branching pattern of evolution resulted from a process he called natural selection, in which the struggle for existence has a similar effect to the artificial selection involved in selective breeding. The observations and theories he developed during his voyage supported Charles Robert Darwin (DAR-win; 12 February 1809 – 19 April 1882) was an English naturalist, geologist, and biologist, widely known for his contributions to evolutionary biology

The stories regarding Huxley's famous 1860 Oxford evolution debate with Samuel Wilberforce were a key moment in the wider acceptance of evolution and in his own career, although some historians think that aspects of the surviving story of the debate is a later fabrication. Huxley had been planning to leave Oxford on the previous day, but, after an encounter with Robert Chambers, the author of Vestiges, he changed his mind and decided to join the debate. Wilberforce was coached by Richard Owen, against

Domestic Animals (1809), Observations upon Hawking (1826), and Observations upon the Instinct of Animals (1836). 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Theistic evolution Modern theistic evolution accepts the general scientific consensus on the age of the Earth, the age of the universe. It rejects the

strict creationist doctrines of special creation, but can include beliefs such as creation of the human soul. Theistic evolution is not in itself a scientific theory, but includes a range of views about how science relates to religious beliefs and the extent to which God intervenes. Later observations by Protestant Theistic evolution (also known as theistic evolutionism or God-guided evolution), alternatively called evolutionary creationism, is a view that God acts and creates through laws of nature. Here, God is taken as the primary cause while natural causes are secondary, positing that the concept of God and religious beliefs are compatible with the findings of modern science, including evolution. It involves the systematic study of any category of natural objects or organisms, so while it dates from studies in the ancient Greco-Roman world and the mediaeval Arabic world, through to European Renaissance naturalists working in near isolation, today's natural history is a cross-discipline umbrella of many specialty sciences; e.g., geobiology has a strong multidisciplinary nature.

The Descent of Man, and Selection in Relation to Sex Darwin notes that The Descent of Man, and Selection in Relation to Sex is a book by English naturalist Charles Darwin, first published in 1871, which applies evolutionary theory to human evolution, and details his theory of sexual selection, a form of biological adaptation distinct from, yet interconnected with, natural selection. The book discusses many related issues, including evolutionary psychology, evolutionary ethics, evolutionary musicology, differences between human races, differences between sexes, the dominant role of women in mate choice, and the relevance of the evolutionary theory to society. Darwin used the word "descent" to mean lineal descendant of ancestors. In this section of the book, Darwin also turns
