Banjo tunings are often taken up a tone, either by tuning up or using a capo. Violin technique Tuning the violin Playing the violin entails holding the instrument between the jaw and the collar bone (see below for variations of this posture). useful in performance, reducing the ill effects of an out-of-tune string until the arrival of a rest or other opportunity to tune properly. The strings are sounded either by drawing the bow across them (arco), or by plucking them (pizzicato). The left hand regulates the sounding length of the strings by stopping them against the fingerboard with the fingers, producing different pitches

Smaller violin-type instruments exist, including the violino piccolo and the pochette, but these are virtually unused. Most violins have a hollow wooden body, and commonly have four strings (sometimes five), usually tuned in perfect fifths with notes G3, D4, A4, E5, and are most commonly played by drawing a bow across the strings. The violin can also be played by plucking the strings with the fingers (pizzicato) and, in specialized cases, by striking the strings with the wooden side of the bow (col legno)

Tuning is often tested with a light tap Timpani (; Italian pronunciation: ['timpani]) or kettledrums (also informally called tims) are musical instruments in the percussion family. They are played by striking the head with a specialized beater called a timpani stick or timpani mallet. Most modern timpani are pedal timpani and can be tuned quickly and accurately to specific pitches by skilled players through the use of a movable foot-pedal. Thus timpani are an example of kettledrums, also known as vessel drums and semispherical drums, whose body is similar to a section of a sphere whose cut conforms the head. A type of drum categorised as a hemispherical drum, they consist of a membrane called a head stretched over a large bowl traditionally made of copper. Timpani evolved from military drums to become a staple of the classical orchestra 5261558ae3

The term "drum rudiment" is most closely associated with various forms of field drumming, where the snare drum plays a prominent role.
