Comparative historical research Generally, it involves comparisons of social processes across times and places. It overlaps with historical sociology. It is distinguished by the types of questions it asks, not the theoretical framework it employs. This form of research may use any of several theoretical orientations. There are four major methods that researchers use to collect historical data. These are archival data, secondary sources, running records, and recollections Comparative historical research is a method of social science that examines historical events in order to create explanations that are valid beyond a particular time and place, either by direct comparison to other historical events, theory building, or reference to the present day

Electronic paper The contrast ratio in electronic displays available as of 2008 approaches newspaper, and newly developed displays are slightly better. An ideal e-paper display can be read in direct sunlight without the image appearing to fade. Electronic paper was first developed in the 1970s by Nick Sheridon at Xerox's Palo Alto Research Center.

Secondary liability Examples of the gradual recognition by courts of copyright liability extending Secondary liability, or indirect infringement, arises when a party materially contributes to, facilitates, induces, or is otherwise responsible for directly infringing acts carried out by another party. The US has statutorily codified secondary liability rules for trademarks and patents, but for matters relating to copyright, this has solely been a product of case law developments. In other words, courts, rather than Congress, have been the primary developers of theories and policies concerning secondary liability.
